And this is my prayer: that your love may abound more and more in knowledge and depth of insight, so that you may be able to discern what is best and may be pure and blameless for the day of Christ, filled with the fruit of righteousness that comes through Jesus Christ - to the glory and praise of God. - Philippians 1:9-11

A man who lived a long time ago - before Jesus was born was known as a prophet and his name was Malachi. He was very unhappy as the people who organised worship had become careless and people were forgetting to care for others and were failing to act with justice. Malachi said that such lack of care was not pleasing to God. Malachi believed and therefore told everyone that a messenger was coming who would be calling people to prepare for the coming of the Lord. He warned that the words spoken by this person would be extremely harsh. They would be like the searing heat of a furnace used to melt precious metal like silver so that any impurities could be removed, and also like very strong soap used to scrub away any ingrained stain on fabric.

Have you have seen commercials on television where really dirty paths, garage floors, roofs etc are cleaned by a high pressure hose - or an advertisement for a washing powder or bleach where you see the

action of the powder/liquid actually getting rid of the dirt? Malachi's message is that, as surely as these processes penetrate the dirt and get rid of it, so the messenger who is coming to prepare the way for the Lord will be penetrating people's hearts and minds with his words and challenging them to get rid of anything that might cause God pain. Who was the messenger that Malachi referred to ?

Advent is a time for us all to think of and to get rid of anything that we do or say that causes God pain or hurts or our friends or anyone else so that we can truly be ready to welcome Jesus at Christmas.



"A voice of one calling in the wilderness, 'Prepare the way for the Lord, make straight paths for him. Every valley shall be filled in, every mountain and hill made low. The crooked roads shall become straight, the rough ways smooth. And all people will see God's salvation.""

"I will send my messenger, who will prepare the way before me. Then suddenly the Lord you are seeking will come to his temple; the messenger of the covenant, whom you desire, will come," says the LORD Almighty. But who can endure the day of his coming? Who can stand when he appears? For he will be like a refiner's fire or a launderer's soap. He will sit as a refiner and purifier of silver; he will purify the Levites and refine them like gold and silver. Then the LORD will have men who will bring offerings in righteousness, and the offerings of Judah and Jerusalem will be acceptable to the LORD, as in days gone by, as in former years."

Our morning worship service is videotaped each Sunday, and made available online later in the day. You can join us at



081224 – HOPE - A December to Remember



The year 2024 has almost run its course very quickly and here we find ourselves in December! As we journey on in hope of a better tomorrow in our world; we can remember this beautiful hymn – O God our Help in Ages Past by Isaac Watts, to keep our hopes alive - that no matter what we go through, it will be well for us when we put our trust in God.

December's name derives from the Latin word decem (meaning ten). When we talk about the 10 commandments, we refer to it as the DECALOGUE which simply means the Ten Laws. December was

originally the tenth month of the year in the calendar of Romulus c. 750 BC, which began in March. December was a month of celebration even before Christendom: In Roman times, the mid-winter festival of Saturn was celebrated – the Saturnalia. It was a time of feasting and merry making; even slaves and their masters switched places for a while. The Saturnalia culminated with the winter solstice, which fell on December 25 in the Roman calendar. As the last month of the year in the Gregorian calendar, December ends with New Year's Eve on December 31. Many people around the world count down to the new year and celebrate with fireworks and well-wishes. Although in many other cultures, the new year begins on very different dates. December officially became the twelfth month in the year 153 BCE. In the first week, 2 December is celebrated as the International Day for the Abolition of Slavery. It provides an opportunity for governments, organizations, and individuals worldwide to come together and take steps to eliminate modern slavery and support survivors. Our Hope is that other inhumane laws and activities will end for all peoples to be free!

December is a time for celebration, reflection, and anticipation. As both the Gregorian and Julian calendars come to a close with these 31 days, it marks a significant cultural and historical milestone. The month is filled with a variety of festivals, holidays, and observances, offering a rich opportunity for cultural reflection and historical contemplation. The first Sunday of December offers, the candle \hat{L} of Hope, lit on our Advent wreath, is a beam of light in our December cold dark world – a glimmer of our Hopes and prayers!

"Hope" is one of the most beautiful words in the English language. It evokes thoughts of sunrises that push back all kinds of darkness. It suggests birth, healing, promise, positivity and possibility. Hope makes us able to keep on going, or if we have fallen to get up and try again. Hope is a gift that our faith can give to us that will indeed meet the need of our hungry hearts. Hope is the essence of the Christian faith. The good news is that hope is there for us. But most of us have yet to learn to discover it and take hold of it. This is the hope for a lost world and a reminder that Jesus Christ will come again as He did some two thousand years ago.

I do not wish to force any one to believe as I do; neither will I permit anyone to deny me the right to believe that the last days are near at hand. The words and signs of Jesus Christ compel me to believe that. For the history of the centuries that have passed since the birth of Jesus nowhere reveals conditions like those of the present times. There has never been such building of advancement in the world. Much of what is happening in our world today is very peculiar than ever before. Increase in knowledge and science, information galore and a juxtapositioned with abundance of wickedness, deception and hatred. In addition, humans are delving very much into the mysteries of things; that today a teen knows more than twenty doctors formerly knew.

The drama of history is not going to just fizzle out or end in a whimper! It is going to come to the kind of climax that he who conceived


the drama wants for it. Whether you are prepared or not; whether you believe it or not.... every year we sing joyfully; You better watch out, You better not cry, Better not pout, I'm telling you why: Santa Claus is comin' to town.

In the same way Jesus Christ is coming soon. Maranatha! You better get prepared. We share a dream of a coming Messiah, the One who would set life aright, the One who would open the way to abundant joy and peace, hope, love and life.
